



Today we will identify who of the characters, "brought" what to help in making stone soup. Here are some pictures of what we will be learning about and doing today.






















Brought is an action word used over and over in our story because each character brought something for the soup. Today we will have a chance to be a character in the story and each student will bring up the item to put in the soup as

These are the characters in our story...
















ACTIVITY TIME! Today for our activity we will all have an opportunity to be one of the characters in the story bringing something to make stone soup.



























Who wants to be the fox? Have the student come up to the front of the class put on the fox hat, give the student the stone and have the student sit back down.







Who wants to be the bear? Have him/her come up and put on the bear hat. Give him/her the pot and have them sit back down.








Who wants to be the elephant? Have the student come up, put on the elephant hat give him some water. Tell them to go back and sit down.






Who wants to be the rabbit? Come up to the front of the class and put on the rabbit hat. Give the student the carrots and tell them to go back to their seat.





Who wants to be the pig? Come to the front of the room and put the pig hat on the student. Give the student the peas and have them sit down again.






Who wants to be the mouse? Have that student come to the front of the room, put on the mouse hat and give the student the beans to hold. Tell him to go sit back down.

When the teacher sees the animal hat at on the page, she will call that student to the front so they can help act out the story.








